## Moving Beyond LOCKDOWN

### - Response Options for Dealing with a Violent School Intruder

Despite the many efforts of schools to protect children, our nation continues to experience tragic school shootings. As law enforcement experts analyze these horrific events, they are able to provide schools with information on how to be better prepared, not only taking steps to prevent an event from occurring but also training students and staff on procedures needed to increase the chances of surviving a violent intruder in a school.

The A.L.i.C.E program has been designed by law enforcement and incorporates recommendations from U.S. Homeland Security, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, and NYPD in responding to a violent intruder.

The A.L.i.C.E program uses technology and information in a way that allows staff and students to make informed decisions in a crisis, emphasizes removing as many people as possible from the danger zone, and provides realistic training to staff so those involved in a crisis have a better chance of surviving.

All district employees and students are trained in the A.L.i.C.E program.

### What is A.L.i.C.E.

**Alert** Get the word out! “Armed intruder in the building,” instead of Code Red. Use clear concise language to convey the type and location of the event.

**Lockdown** Good starting point. We will continue to lockdown students in a secure area.

**Inform** Communicate so students and staff know what is happening, which allows for good decision-making.

**Counter** Apply skills to district and confuse intruders to gain control of the situation.

**Evacuate** Reduce the number of potential targets by removing students as soon as possible.

### Student Training

Age appropriate student training will occur during the months of September and October

Parents can help prepare their child(ren) for A.L.i.C.E. by helping them understanding the following:

- There are people, of all ages and types that can be mean and may wish them harm.
- Self-confidence comes from trying things that are hard and getting better each time.
- There are many solutions and options when faced with a problem.
- When prepared for difficult situations, they can make informed decisions and will have more self control.
- Your child is smart and capable if they have the knowledge.
- Help your child identify and assess possible crisis situations.
- Have your child explain the different safety drills and what they mean.
- Discuss the importance of following teacher’s directions without hesitation.
